Toowoomba Region Sport, Active Recreation and Healthy Living Plan 2019	The Toowoomba Region Sport, Active Recreation and Healthy Living Plan 2019 seeks to promote sport and recreation facilities to assist in promoting active and healthy lifestyles within the region. The plan provides the following overview: "Toowoomba Regional council has a commitment to the health of residents as evident by many strategic actions outlined in the corporate plan. The Sport, Active Recreation and Healthy Living Plan builds on existing Council work and reports and will assist to guide actions in supporting sport, active recreation and healthy living across the Toowoomba Region in the short to medium term through to 2026. Scope of the project includes: Sport Active Recreation and Healthy Living Nature Based Recreation Regional Skate/Scooter/Bike Velodrome needs assessment Regional Skate/Scooter/Bike Velodrome needs assessment Regional Skate/scooter/Bike Sock Climbing, Bouldering and Abseiling" To assist in ensuring it achieves the above, the plan has assessed existing demographics, and sport and recreation facilities on a land use area basis and provides individual recommendations for each area to ensure all residents are provided with adequate facilities.	The LGID seeks to facilitate the establishment of a regionally significant sport and recreation precinct. The proposed development will provide a range of regionally significant sport and recreation facilities at this location to encourage active lifestyles for all members of the public. Accordingly, the development assists in achieving the outcomes sought for the region under the Toowoomba Region Sport, Active Recreation and Health Living Plan 2019. The "Active and Health Community Profile – Toowoomba West" section of this plan reviews the existing demographics, and sport and recreation facilities within the western Toowoomba area and provides recommendations to improve the facilities in the area. In this instance, the recommendation that relates to this development states the following: "Ensure development of the West Toowoomba Land Use Area in accordance with the Land Use Investigation Plan and Structure Plan for the area, which has active and healthy living at the core." As demonstrated at section 7.4.3 of the EAR, the proposed development generally complies with the intent and outcomes recommended by the West Toowoomba Land Use Investigation 2016, and accordingly complies with the Toowoomba Region Sport, Active Recreation and Healthy Living Plan 2019
Toowoomba Regional Strategic Sport and Recreation Plan 2010	The Toowoomba Regional Strategic Sport and Recreation Plan 2010 sought to review existing and future sport and recreation facilities, programs and services within the region to provide a balanced response to the needs of the community. Section 2 of the Plan provides the following summary of the outcomes sought by this plan:	Section 6 – Moving Forward of the Toowoomba Regional Strategic Sport and Recreation Plan 2010 identified that a new regional outdoor sports complex was required to service the region, as per the following extract: "This Plan clearly notes the need to develop a new regional outdoor sports complex offering a range of (predominately) field sport opportunities to meet the needs of both the existing and predicted future users.



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	"1. development of a twenty year sport and recreation plan highlighting areas of priority and including a realistic and achievable action plan and estimated budgetary allocations 2. identification of future prioritised facility development (both new facilities and upgrades to existing facilities) based on demand and sustainability for the region 3. identification of preferred management systems for sport and recreation facilities 4. identification development."	Further, the Open Space Network Study has identified a current deficiency in development sports land with this deficiency predicted to increase (as the population grows) unless additional facilities are developed." The plan further identifies three (3) potential sites for the recommended regional precinct, being Wyreema Road (south of Drayton), the Toowoomba Airport (if it was relocated) and Charlton (the subject land). Given the Toowoomba Airport is not currently planned to be relocated, and the significant growth expected within the West Toowoomba Land Use Area, the Infrastructure Entity has determined the Charlton site (the subject land) to be the most appropriate option in this instance. The LGID seeks to facilitate the establishment of aregionally significant sport and recreation precinct, which will provide a range of sport and recreation facilities (predominately facilities for field sports) as recommended by the Plan. Accordingly, the proposed development is considered to be in accordance with the recommendations of this plan and assists in achieving the outcomes sought for the community under this plan.
Toowoomba Regional Council Corporate Plan 2019-2024	The Toowoomba Regional Council Corporate Plan 2019-2024 outlines the vision, goals, outcomes and strategic action that Toowoomba Regional Council have identified as necessary to ensure that the needs and aspirations of the region can be met. The plan is reviewed quarterly by Council to determine whether the goals are being achieved. The Corporate Plan outlines the following goals that Council wishes to achieve over the life of the plan: "People Council supports a safe, health and engaged region. As a result, it does not provide recommendations for the design and incorporation of transport facilities within individual non-residential developments. Notwithstanding this, the TRSP has been designed to incorporate a range internal transport options, including pedestrian, cycle and vehicle networks. These networks are
